
# Flag Up! Diver Down!

teer clear! That red flag with the white stripe fluttering over the water has a message for boaters and it means stay away - at least 100 yards away. A diver is usually down there somewhere beneath the surface and if there is a dive boat nearby it might not be able to maneuver out of the way of another boat approaching.

In coastal areas the flag can also be the international blue-and-white alpha flag which has the same meaning; diver down, keep away, speed slow and although it applies to federal waters,



being familiar with it is a bonus for safe boating.

The diver down flag is especially important for all boaters to recognize in Maine. With the State's thousands of lakes and ponds, streams, mighty rivers and reportedly the 3rd-longest state coastal shoreline in the country, there's frequent demand for state-of-the-art search and rescue and criminal investigations; increasing demand for underwater conservation initiatives such as checking for invasive plants, harvesting the plants and covering patches of them with benthic barriers; and a growing popularity for diving as an enjoyable

Continued from page 1 recreational pursuit.

Fortunately to match all that water, Maine has several highly-trained law enforcement dive teams: the Maine State Police, the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, the county sheriff's departments (Kennebec county has an elite response team) and individual members of some local fire departments. When any of them are on a scene safety precautions are significantly in place and there's no mistaking the stayaway warnings.

But recreationally? Sharing the lakes and waterways is a way of life and while divers may practice safety precautions boaters are not always aware of the signals.

Maine's dive flag laws are few and older and they focus on marine species harvesting while the state boater safety handbook provides only a brief reference to United States Coast Guard requirements on federal waters.

Earlier this summer a potential near-fatal boat/diver crash on North Pond made headlines. The diver was following flag protocol. The boaters had, according to reports, been unaware of the diver flag significance and thought it was a buoy that had broken loose and should be retrieved.

With nobody seriously injured, the takeaway which lingers from the incident is the need for publicity, for education and for reaching as many lake users as possible with the significance of the diver down flag through local media, through

lake associations, through word-of-mouth and perhaps through local or state ordinances, i.e. bring the attention inland.

Education about flags is where much of current lake boating safety began. There are those who remember when, before the current plastic state-maintained buoys, lake hazards were marked by flags installed and maintained by the local fishing guides and although the flags adhered to a system of differing colors as navigation guides, the message was always the same: see a flag, stay away.

The summer of 2020 saw a spike in boating accidents in Maine, including those related to scuba diving, and although causes range from the pandemic to climate change to the overcrowding of resources the reality remains that healthy, wholesome outdoor activities are on the rise and scuba diving is one of them.

Sharing the State's lakes and waterways is a way of life. Sharing them safely is a priority starting with the stay-away message from the red flag with the white stripe - the diver down flag.



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#### **Giant Trolls Invade Boothbay**

re you looking for a nice day trip? Why not take a drive down scenic A Maine roads to see "Guardians of the Seeds," an exhibit of five giant trolls that were installed at the Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens in Boothbay this past spring

Made out of recycled wood, the trolls are the creations of Danish artist Thomas Dambo, who has created dozens of giant, wooden trolls all over the world, including in Florida, Colorado, South Korea, China, Denmark, Puerto Rico, and Belgium.

Dambo and his associates built the heads, hands, and feet in his studio in Denmark and had them shipped to Maine. On site, he, his ten-person crew, and over 150 local volunteers spent two months assembling the trolls and adding finishing touches using local materials. For example, for one of the trolls, he used the roots of fallen trees at the Gardens to make a beard, and for two others, he made fur from the bark of oak trees that had been milled into lumber in Maine sawmills.

The first troll you'll see, Roskva, is 25 - 30' tall. He is the only one of the five who stands, but the others are similarly sized, in various postures of repose. Each troll has clue to guide visitors to a cache of "secret seeds" hidden in a grove deep in the Gardens' woods.

If you're an able-bodied adult and you don't take too many wrong turns on the labyrinth of trails, you can see all the trolls in one hour. Allow a second hour to find the "secret seeds" and return to the visitors center. (The time estimates on the Gardens' website are quite a bit longer.)

But why rush? There are many treasures, natural and man-made, to behold along the Gardens' sylvan paths. You can enjoy the experience more, if you follow Pete Kallin's advice and take a kid along, which will force you to slow down anyway.

If you're not up to all that walking, you can see Roskva without leaving the central gardens, and the second troll, Lilja, is not far away. Plus, there's lots to see in the central gardens themselves. They include a butterfly and moth house, a curved wooden arbor covered with climbing ornamental plants, a dahlia garden with more than eighty varieties in almost every color but blue, a "Garden of the Five Senses," and the Alfond Children's Garden, which has plantings, small buildings, and play areas inspired by popular Maine children's books. The central gardens have wide, smooth paths on gentle terrain and have plenty of places to sit. One could easily spend an Continued on page 4...



afternoon exploring just that part of the property.

During the summer, the gardens are open daily, 9:00 - 5:00. Admission times are staggered and you will need to reserve tickets in advance. Admission is \$22 for most adults, \$18 for veterans and those aged 65 and older, and free for active-duty service-members and anyone eligible for SNAP/EBT, WIC, Medicaid, or MaineCare.

The cost is \$10 for children 3 - 17 and free for infants. Thanks to L.L.Bean, a major sponsor of the trolls exhibit, all children can enter for free on Wednesdays this July and August. On those days, reservations for children are not required, just for the adults who accompany them. There is also a family rate of \$55 for two adults and two children.

In light traffic, the journey from Belgrade to Boothbay takes an hour and a quarter. Since coastal traffic tie-ups can occur in summer, allow an extra 15 minutes or so. 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#### Fishing, Foraging, and Hiking! Take It Outside • by Pete Kallin

ard to believe this is already the 6th column of the summer. We have finally gotten some cooler weather and a bit of much-needed rain that has both cooled the lakes off a bit and stimulated the growth of wild berries and mushrooms in the woods. Fourth of July saw light rain much of the day but the weather broke just in time for the fireworks. My younger son, Rob, drove up from NH for the long weekend, stopping along the way to buy a new fishing pole after one of his dogs ate his old one. After purchasing his three-day nonresident fishing license, we headed out for some fishing in the rain. Rob wanted to catch a pike with his new pole, so we headed for a few areas that had some nice weed beds where they like to hang out. After tying on a wire leader and a big jointed Rapala lure, we began trolling over the weed beds. Suddenly he had a strike and reeled in a yellow perch that was about the same size as his lure. He laughed and said, "I thought you were going to find me a pike, Dad!" I said, "Don't worry, that's a good sign. Yellow perch are pretty much pike's favorite food. We'll go back over that spot again." On the second pass over the weed bed, his rod bent over and line started streaming out. He said, "Back up, I think I'm stuck on the bottom." As I turned the boat back towards weeds, he realized that the drag on his new reel was set way too low. As he increased the drag, he realized that the "bottom" was moving, and he actually had a fish on. Eventually he landed a pike about 27" long.

I am on the Stewardship Committee of the 7-Lakes Alliance and spent a couple of days last

week hiking some of the local trails to make sure they survived the big storm and were safe to hike. While at French Mountain, I met Raj and his family who were visiting the area from Marietta, Ohio. They had so much fun hiking French that they were headed over to hike Mount Phillip as well. Also at French Mountain, I ran into the extended Greenan Family who are up from South Carolina visiting Grandpa Dick and Grandma Sue, along with Jesse Stevens, a friend of Dick's 15-yr old grandson, Ben. Everyone was having a great time and anticipating a fishing trip on the Kennebec River the next day. Grandpa Dick reported the guys caught over 100 smallmouth bass in a couple of hours as well as a nice catfish. White catfish have become established in the Kennebec and are becoming more prevalent. Catfish are normally very tasty but there are fish consumption advisories against eating fish from that area of the Kennebec so I don't recommend eating them if caught in the Kennebec.

Last week I picked both red and black raspberries, as well as yellow chanterelle mushrooms on some of the 7-Lakes Alliance properties I was visiting. In addition to a lot of gourmet cooking for free, I have been getting some of the berries into the freezer and drying some of the mushrooms for future use.

Take advantage of the rest of the summer and get out on the lakes or hike or bike in the hills. And take a kid along. You will be creating memories that will last. Check out the events at the 7-LA web site (https://www.7lakesalliance.org/) and the sign in front of the MLRC. I am leading a



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#### Call of the Loon

ast night we had a very successful evening of banding six adult loons in Great Pond by the talented and experienced folks at Biodiversity Institute in Gorham, Maine in addition to our Loon Expert and Consultant, Lee Attix. Last year, we banded seven birds, five in Long Pond and two on Great Pond over a period of two nights, so six birds in one evening was indeed, a very productive evening.

Loons are captured for determination of age, sex, and overall health by assessing weight, leg and beak lengths, blood and feather analyses for heavy metals contaminants and banding for easier recognition on future surveys and to track successful nesting pairs. By first surveying the territories early that morning of the banding, the researchers search for an adult pair with at least one chick. They then return in the dark and approach the territory with a spotlight and a binocular equipped observer. Once the adult(s) and chick are spotted and held in contact with the spotlight, they are carefully and very slowly approached while calling the birds in with a chick call. While following the light and call, the adults generally swim right up to the boat. Once alongside, they are scooped up with a large net and secured by other crew whose responsibilities are to secure that head and deadly beak with a towel and tucking under the arm pit of the volunteer holding the loon in his/her lap. Remarkably the loon has a respiration rate similar to ours and can be quite docile in the arms of the crew but can also in an instant, without warning, kick out those powerful legs in a raucous escape attempt!

It takes about thirty minutes to obtain two vials of blood, three feather samples, and those numerous measurements. During this period the chick(s) is either secured in a blanket lined box or held by a crewmember which is a sobering experience enjoyed by all. Last year, we were able to measure Great Pond's Ram Island chick that was just old and large enough to have his/her own bands!

These evening captures (and release!), measurements and bandings allow the Belgrade Lakes Association and others to not only better assess the health of our loon population and breeding

#### Still More at MIFF24

While the screens will soon go dark on the 24th annual Maine International Film Festival, there's still more to see. During the final three days, two fictional features and one quasi-documentary will be premiered; six features that debuted earlier in the week will be shown again; the Maine Student Film and Video Festival will present its awards; and the Kneeling Art Photography Project will finish its run.

This year's sole Canadian feature will have its New England debut at the Waterville Opera House on Friday, July 16, at 7:00. The film is set during the Oka Crisis, a 78-day uprising from July to September 1990, which was triggered by a plan to expand a golf course and build townhouses on land near Montreal that included a Mohawk burial ground. According to MIFF's website, "Twelve-year-old Beans is on the edge: torn between innocent childhood and delinquent adolescence; and between Native and Settler culture... She must grow up fast to become the tough Mohawk warrior she needs to be..." *Beans* will be shown again Saturday at 3:00 in Railroad Square's Cinema 1.

After taking a hiatus in 2020 due to the pandemic, the Maine Student Film & Video Festival will be back for its 43rd year. Since MIFF began, the student festival has been held during MIFF at Railroad Square or the Opera House, usually on MIFF's second Saturday. This year, it will take place Saturday at noon in Railroad Square's Cinema 1. Admission is free.

The student festival features short films, no more than 10 minutes each, made by Mainers from kindergarten through Grade 12. Films are judged according to the age group of their creators (Grades K-6, Grades 7-8, and Grades 9-12) and by category (Narrative, Documentary, and Creative). Winners receive filmmaking gear, scholarships, or a \$500 grand prize. For more information, visit mainestudentfilm.org.

On Saturday at 7:00, the Opera House will give the world premiere of *The Last Election and Other Love Stories*. This new film comes from the makers of *American Thief*, which had its world premiere at MIFF last year. That film culminates on Election Night 2016. This time, the cast and crew goes to Times Square for Election Day 2020 to make, what the MIFF site calls "a documentary, a podcast, and a flash ethnography about the United States on that day." In *The Last Election*, Khadim Diop and Xisko Monroe, the two lead actors from *American Thief*, are citizen journalists creating a podcast called "The Last Election." For 24 hours starting at sunrise on Election Day, they interview people on the street, asking each person the same three questions, including, "Could this be the last election?" Like *Beans*, *The Last Election* will have a second screening the next afternoon at 3:00 in Cinema 1.

The festival's closing weekend will also offer a second (or third!) chance to see six features and two shorts compilations, all of which were described in last week's issue. These screenings take place at Railroad Square in either Cinemas 1 or Cinema 2 (RR1 & RR2). The titles, days, times (all p.m.), and locations are *Kansas City* (Fri., 3:00, RR1), *The Loneliness of the Bones* (Fri., 3:30, RR2), *Missing in Brooks County* (Fri., 7:00, RR1), *The Big Scary S Word* (Fri., 7:30, RR2), *Maine Shorts I* (Sat., 3:30, RR2), *Sapelo* (Sat., 7:00, RR1), *Maine Shorts II* (Sat., 7:30, RR1), and *Bread in the Bones* (Sun., 3:30, RR2). In addition, you can watch *Sapelo, Missing in Brooks County*, the two Maine shorts collections, and also Transitions Shorts and From Away Shorts, online through MIFF's website, *www.miff.org*, until 11:45 p.m. Sunday.

MIFF's Closing Night feature is *Cryptozoo*, which MIFF's site calls an "incredibly animated indie film [that] appears to have taken some acid." The story takes place either on another world or an alternate version of our own, where various imaginary and mythological creatures are real and where their human guardians are beginning to question whether the zoo that they are building is the the best way to keep "cryptids" safe from a military that wants to use them as weapons. Perhaps it is better for these creatures to remain hidden and unknown? The film's sole screening will be at 7:00 on Sunday at the Opera House. For this screening, admission is \$12; for the other MIFF screenings, it's \$10.

Finally, if you haven't already done so, be sure to check out the Kneeling Art Photography Project in Colby's new "Arts Collaborative" at 18 Main Street, across from the new Lockwood Hotel. The exhibit, which is open daily during MIFF from 1:00 to 5:00, shows photos of diverse Mainers working for racial justice. You can also have your picture taken as you literally take a knee in support. Admission is free.

This exhibit in the former Waterville Hardware building will be the first time that the building has been open to the public since renovations were completed this spring. Colby College bought the structure six years ago, one of six downtown properties that it acquired between 2015 and 2018. The arts collaborative has exhibition and performance space on the first floor, studios for visiting artists on the second and third floors, and offices for the Lunder Institute for American Art on the fourth floor. Colby plans to hold a formal grand opening in the fall; the details are yet to determined.






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


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
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
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
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

#### The Dams Keeper Report

What a week of BAD weather we've had! A cold and rainy 4th was not what the Chamber of Commerce was talking about a month ago! And who was the fool suggesting rain dances because we were in a drought? (Oh, Oh, that was me!) And you would think that with all of this precipitation our ponds would be over flowing, which they are surprisingly NOT! During the past ten days, the rain gauge at the Wings Mill Dam recorded just 1.34" of rain which did not represent the deluge the Village received in that microburst event, showing just how localized that storm was.

As I write this weekly's column, the 'experts' are now forecasting 1.63" of precipitation for the next ten days which if it happens should bring all of our ponds up to two to three inches ABOVE full pond which will seem like a flood but should not float anyone's dock nor interfere with our nesting birds.

Even with all of this rain, our water levels are not going up as drastically as we would have expected which demonstrates just how low our water table is. Salmon/McGrath reported that they are now just 1" below full pond with their one gate opened just enough for the mandated 1cfs. Our neighbors on Messalonskee are now down 6.36" below full pond with their gates intermittently opened for electricity generation. Long Pond is presently just ½" below full with Great Pond actually ½" above at full pond. But again, that's all going to change with the incoming rains.

Enjoy the family, your vacation and keep those umbrellas and sweaters handy!



#### Maine Quilts 250 Years of Comfort and Community by Laureen A. LaBar

Quite a find for me to purchase this book on Main Street in Waterville because both Harriet Beecher Stowe and Martha Ballard are referenced in the index. Who knew that sunbonnets were sometimes guilted? I did not, but Stowe mentions these quilted hats in her work of many books beyond Uncle Tom's Cabin.

"Martha Ballard of Hallowell noted quilting several times in her diary, generally in the fall, after the garden work was largely done for the year. In the year or two before their weddings, her daughters made several quilts, sometimes inviting friends to help...Martha Ballard called some 'bed quilts,' but others just 'quilts'."

This large volume full of fabulous color and black and white photos, coffee table size, 242 pages, was published by Down East Books because the 2020 pandemic cancelled a very special quilt show. "The Maine State Museum has, at this writing, over 180 Maine quilts, a collection that is still growing...History curator Lauren LaBar has long studied Maine quilts. She conceived and organized this exhibition, the first major exhibit of Maine quilts ever produced."

Local Mount Vernon quilter Nanna Bradley Whittier is within these shiny pages for her "stenciled spread". Isn't that something! South Salon quilter from "the Paul Family embroidered a wool quilt" pictured in this special collection. Both of these works of art were discovered during recent estate sales in bottom drawers of old furniture. What artists we have among our families.

I attended a wonderful quilt show not too long ago (before pandemic shut downs) at the Augusta Convention Center. It was especially good to consult an expert there about my family's Sunbonnet Sue created by grandma around 90 plus years ago. She managed to make many quilts with help from friends in the front parlor on grandpa's constructed wooden frame.

ssays within this lovely, colorful collection of quilts are by Lynne Z. Uncle Bob drew the quilt designs in pencil. When grandma saw some stitching not up to her standards, she would invite that particular friend to the kitchen to help with refreshments. Stitch perfection for grandma.

July 16 - July 22, 2021

I inquired about my Sunbonnet Sue embroidery band on each bonnet. My Mom learned her stitches and practiced a different one on each bonnet. She was only twelve years old and the colorful stitchery is beautiful to this day. The expert in Augusta told me that this was an original idea for Sunbonnet Sue. I came away loving this quilt even more since using it on my childhood bed to placing it carefully at the foot of our double Queen size bed to this day. Sometimes I hang it on our quilt rack to give the fabric and fine stitching a rest.

Grandma and her friends were able to make quilts for everyone in our family, including every grandchild. My favorites went to my nephew, Bow tie design, and my sister, Texas Star. Canton, Ohio quilts in our family are precious like the Maine quilters creations collected in this very special quilt

I must admit that I am personally fascinated by the new machinestitched quilts with photo like images of almost anything. The new technologies offer a new kind of quilt art. "Twenty-first-century quilters in Maine are creating works that quilters before them could not have dreamed of...As they have done for 250 years in Maine, quilts continue to offer comfort and community".

The Angel Oak quilt was such an accurate photo-type reproduction at the Cobblestone presentation in Charleston, S.C. several years ago, that I had to return to the show the next day in Mount Pleasant and take photos. Embroidery threads on the ancient branches provided dark shadows. What a lovely depiction of an old-growth tree. Better yet, on most quilts, look at the back design of swirls and small stitches, all for beauty and comforting warmth.
