

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



Are You Tick Smart?

While the "Belgrades" is beautiful and has many outdoor options for activities, it is also home to ticks. Maine's tick season is off to a strong start due to a milder winter and wet spring, leading to increased tick activity and the risk of tickborne diseases like Lyme disease. Ticks are active here starting in April and going into Fall. The season is also starting earlier and lasting longer due to

warmer average temperatures. Lyme disease is the most commonly reported vector-borne illness in the United States with approximately 30,000 new cases reported annually. The first documented case of Lyme disease in Maine was identified in 1986 and the incidence has been steadily increasing within the state ever since. Maine has as many as up to 15 different kinds of ticks, however it is the blacklegged tick (commonly known as the deer tick) that can transmit the following diseases: Lyme, Anaplasmosis, Babesiosis, Hard Tick Relapsing Fever, Powassan Encephalitis, and Alpha-Gal (Red Meat) Allergy.

Maine is home to the University of Maine Cooperative Extension tick lab. Located in Orono, the lab offers testing to the Maine community. This is an invaluable resource, as the lab will check a tick (cost is \$2)0 found on you, or a loved one and test it for tick borne pathogens. This allows for proper treatment, and peace of mind. Having lost a family member to a tick borne illness, I am always educating the Maine community about the lab. Do not flush the tick – save it and send it.

Here in Kennebec county in 2024 the lab tested 212 ticks. 91 tested positive for Borrelia burgdorferi (lyme), 21 tested positive for Anaplasma phagocytophilum (Anaplasmosis), 24 tested positive for Babesia microti (Babesiosis) and 3 tested positive for Powassan. Some of these diseases are bacterial and can be treated with antibiotics and others, like Powassan, are viral and don't respond to antibiotics.

What can you do to protect yourself? Prevention is key!

- Wear light-colored clothing to make ticks easier to detect.
- Wear long pants tucked into socks or boots and tuck your shirt into your pants to keep ticks on the outside of your clothes.
- Use products that contain permethrin to treat clothing and gear
- Other tick repellents recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) include picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, and IP3535
- The use of repellents that contain 20-30% DEET on exposed skin and clothing can effectively repel ticks for several hours.
- Tumble dry clothing on high heat for 10-20 minutes.
- Do your TICK CHECK! They especially migrate to arm pits, behind the knees, between the legs, in and around the ears, belly button and hair.


2024 Accomplishments and Launching a Busy Summer Season

Welcome Back

reetings to the greater Belgrade Lakes Community and welcome back **J**summer residents and visitors. When I was growing up and there was any kind of ruckus in the house, which was pretty common with six kids, my mother would tell us to, "Take it outside!" We would then head out to the woods behind the house to find something to do. My mother was a wise woman. Fifty years before Richard Louv wrote Last Child in the Woods in 2008, she had an innate understanding of "Nature Deficit Disorder" and knew that direct exposure to nature is essential for a child's healthy physical and emotional development. Louv and others later proved that kids who spend a lot of time outside are healthier, have longer attention spans, and are less likely to suffer from depression or childhood obesity. If you haven't read Louv's book, you should. I hope this column will inspire you to take advantage of all the outdoor recreation opportunities in our area and especially about the importance of getting youngsters outside and interacting actively with the natural world instead of spending hours passively browsing social media. Mother Nature is an amazing teacher and we can all learn from her, especially in these stressful times.

Staying physically active is one of the best ways to keep your mind and body healthy, and carefully planned and executed outdoor activities are inherently safer than indoor activities. 7 Lakes continues to add new properties and new trails. The hiking trails (including some new ones!) in the Kennebec Highlands and nearby 7-Lakes Alliance (former BRCA) properties like French Mountain, Mount Phillip, Fogg Island, and The Mountain are beautiful, verdant, and awash in spring and early summer wildflowers like trillium and lady slippers and birds and other wildlife. Visit the 7-Lakes Alliance website (https://www.7lakesalliance.org/) for the latest updates and to download maps of the trails. Last year we published a new version of our

local Trail Map and Guide. It is available for purchase at the Resource Center as well as at Day's Store. The new Quill-Hill Mountain Trails off Drury Lane are scenic and not very steep, making them particularly appropriate for hiking with youngsters and oldsters.

I have been busy this spring as a Mentor for the Atlantic Salmon Federation's Fish Friends program, helping students in RSU-18 and at the MLRC, learn about the life cycle of Atlantic salmon by raising salmon fry in refrigerated tanks in the classroom. Maine currently has the only remaining wild population of this Federally endangered species in this country. Our students recently stocked almost 600 salmon fry into the Bond Brook and Sandy River. Some of the students got a tour of the nearby Governor Hill Fish Hatchery in Augusta.







Maine Student Film + Video **Festival to Showcase Young** Filmmakers at MIFF28



The 28th Maine International Film Festival (MIFF) is fast approaching, and this year brings with it a special opportunity for Maine students to showcase their film projects before an international audience with professional filmmakers from around the world. The Maine Student Film + Video Festival (MSFVF) will be held Saturday, July 19, during the final weekend of MIFF28.

Maine-based students in grades K-12 are eligible to submit their short films to the festival program by June 15. Selected shorts will be shown on the big screen at the Maine Film Center (MFC) during MIFF, providing the next generation of Maine moviemakers the rare opportunity to see their work presented in the highest quality audiovisual projection in the state. Participating students have the chance to win professional filmmaking gear or a \$500 grand prize sponsored by Maine Public.

"It's an incredible opportunity for students and young filmmakers to screen their works as part of an international film festival," said Mike Perreault, executive director of the Maine Film Center and MIFF. "They're able to make connections with filmmakers from Maine and around the world and gain, perhaps, their first experience exhibiting their work to a general audience. With free admission for the public and several prizes in store at each edition of MSFVF, we're proud to celebrate the best young filmmakers in Maine in this way."

"It's very important to provide Maine children with as many opportunities as possible to explore their passions and create art that matters to them," Ahlstrin-Muniec said. "Between MSFVF and our youth film classes throughout the year, MFC's goal is to help foster the next generation of Maine filmmakers and encourage them to proudly express their creativity and feel comfortable experimenting with film

and other media."

MIFF, the largest film festival in Northern New England, offers audiences a unique experience, showcasing the latest international cinema from around the world while simultaneously foregrounding Mainemade projects. Last year's full 100-film program featured 40 countries, but also 22 films that were produced right here in Maine. By sustaining a year-round emphasis on young talent, with MSFVF as the centerpiece, MFC hopes to encourage further development of the state's film industry.

A project of the Maine Film Center, MIFF showcases 100 films during the 10 days of the festival, highlighting the best of American independent, international, and repertory cinema, including the very finest Maine-made productions, celebrated each year with the Tourmaline Prizes. During MIFF, thousands of cinemagoers from near and far will visit the Maine Film Center's three-screen cinema in the Paul J. Schupf Art Center, and enjoy screenings in the 123-year-old Waterville Opera House. The festival's diverse audience includes Waterville locals who have attended the festival for nearly three decades and first-time visitors to Maine from all over the world.

In addition to MSFVF, the Maine Film Center will be announcing more filmmaking workshops and camps for youth this summer.

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
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
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

Foraged spring greens and mushrooms stuffing

In the nearby Kennebec River, the anadromous alewives and shad are returning to spawn. Normally, these fish are still in the river in early June just below the Hathaway dam in Waterville, and I highly recommend trying your hand with a flyrod or light spinning tackle, especially if you have never caught a shad before. The fish are big, strong, and will hit small, weighted flies and jigs bounced along the bottom. They are a lot of fun to catch. By the time this article is published, the water temperature will be in the high 60's in most of our lakes and the bass will be off their own beds but back in the shallows, chasing spawning sunfish. Fast action can be had with streamer flies, surface poppers, jerk baits, or Senko type jigs.

A couple of weeks ago, I had a very successful foraging expedition and gathered lots of fiddleheads and other spring greens, including trout lily and trillium leaves, and Japanese knotweed shoots. I also had some puffball and chanterelle mushrooms in the freezer. I decid-

ed to try to catch a nice trout or perch to stuff with my foraging bounty and bake. All I caught were bass after bass. Finally, I decided to keep the next bass I caught and suddenly the fish stopped biting as I headed back to my cove. About 50 yards from my dock, I cast a bright orange and green jig towards the edge of a tree in the water. A 2-lb bass hit it and I started to reel it in. About 10-ft from the boat, the fish jumped completely out of the water and shook its head, spitting the jig out. Highlights From The Year Past

Summary Report. The biggest takeaways are:

1. The 2024 overall productivity of 0.26 CS/TP (chick productivity per territorial pair) remains very low when compared to the established sustainable population threshold of 0.48 CS/TP. Looking at 2019 (0.35), 2020 (0.17), 2021 (0.35), 2022 (0.30), 2023 (0.26) productivity, no single year approaches 0.48 CS/TP. These consistently low productivity numbers over a six-year period are concerning.

2. For populations to thrive, long-term survival and mate fidelity are critical factors. Early findings raise concerns about loon fidelity in the study area. While return/survival rates are strong, mate fidelity is low. Only two of seven pairs banded in 2023 remained together in 2024 (29%) despite all the adults returning. Overall, only five of 14 pairs since 2020 have remained together (36%). Four years of (banded) data collection is a beginning and integral to the study.

3. Three of the six man-made floating rafts were used for nesting (50%), and two of the three nests were successful (67%). Comparatively, there were a total of 15 natural nest attempts on the two lakes, and six nests were successful (40%). Rafts can be an excellent option where natural nests consistently fail due to

4. Thirty of the 36 banded adult loons returned (83%) to their territory.

5. Nesting was confirmed for the first time in Great Pond's Otter Island territory. The male resident was originally banded in Snake Point Cove back in 2008. The nesting pair hatched and fledged one chick.

6. Last year we had just one chick from all of Long Pond and four chicks from Great Pond that we assumed made the Great Fly-off this past fall.

7. Progress recruiting new citizen volunteers in the community has been slow, however. Our Colby Internship program is a start but does not assure the necessary sustainability. Further study and evaluation of population trends is warranted to help better understand the low productivity and determine if there are additional conservation measures which could be implemented to enhance loon chick productivity.

Loon volunteer assistants are desperately needed. If you love loons, here is the opportunity of a lifetime! Get to know your loons personally while making a difference! Many hands make light work so the more the merrier!

Here's to 2025 and the continuing efforts of our stewardship!

is father also gave him (beside the neigh-**⊥**borhood's first child size bike) his very own canoe when he was eleven, to use on the family's August trips to Belgrade, Maine, which were to Andy 'the golden time of year' and 'sheer enchantment'. Of course, EBWhite passages are what I quickly turned to in this extra long biography of his wife and her New Yorker editing career.

August only in Maine? I just realized that my Maine vacations for years were June and July. Only last summer was short for me with August renting only. EBWhite, according to this new biography of his wife, created Charlotte's Web late in his New Yorker writing career. It took both he and his wife awhile to realize that the saltwater farm in Brooklin offered great tranquility and creative living.

Finally living there full time, EBWhite wrote and rewrote Charlotte's Web for the children of the world. I must admit that this story touches me more as I share it with generation after generation. The eternal life of Charlotte's children and the eternal nature of true friendship seems so human and real, even though it is Wilbur the pig and Charlotte the spider...

Of course, Katharine S. White, hired EBWhite for The New Yorker when she had her first husband's name. I love the fact that Michelle Obama hired Barak as a summer intern in her law firm when Michelle had her maiden name.


Poetry written by EB to his future wife was touching to read:

In the warm sun Of a strange land, I beheld your life And possessed your hand.

In the real cold Of things that are, I have lost hold Of a caught star.

Instead of quitting his job at The New Yorker over his newly discovered love of Katharine, "he tried a smaller version, hopping into his new Model A Ford roadster and heading straight north to Belgrade, Maine, where he stayed a week to ice-skate and 'let a lot of cold fresh Maine air blow through [his] brains."

A few weeks later Katharine confesses in a letter to a loved one that her husband "knocked me down" during a quarrel in front of their children, so she walked out of the marriage. The Bryn Mawr collection of Katharine's letters has this letter in spite of her direction to burn it. Granddaughter Callie donated it after Katharine's death to the Katherine Sergeant Angel White archive at

1936 was another pivotal year in EBWhite's life when he lost his mother. Since both parents were now gone so quickly in one year and his childhood home as well, he once again made a trip to Belgrade and Great Pond. "Things haven't changed much," was the beginning of this famed essay rewritten many times (40 some report), but it started as a personal letter to his brother Stanley during this time of family grief. "The lake hangs clear and still at dawn, and the sound of a cowbell comes softly from a faraway wood lot...Yes sir, I returned to Belgrade, and things don't change much. I thought somebody ought to know."

It seems that this biographer portrays Andy White as a recluse, which perhaps he was, admitting to himself this character flaw as he felt it to be. Even when their son Joe was in second grade in New York, Andy stayed at his beloved farm in North Brooklin on the coast and sent weekly columns to The New Yorker.

In mid-October of their son's second grade year, Andy White left the farm for Belgrade once again and Mount Vernon. He drove on to meet his wife and son at a friend's home. The three dressed turkeys he delivered were a welcome gift and the three happy Whites returned together once again

to New York...

Much about Katharine and her fine editing career and her many family obligations later in life. I skipped a lot of that because I am addicted to EBWhite. Index reading is good for me in this 496 page read, mostly about The New Yorker.

If you are a fan of that magazine, dear reader, you will read more of Katharine's story than I did. I am still puzzled by the unusual cover because photos within this biography show a very lovely countenance which was one draw for our favorite Belgrade Lakes writer, EBWhite. I especially love the photo of Grandma Katharine reading to her grandchildren on a comfy sofa. Also, Andy and Katharine look so happy with their dog Minnie, one of many pets throughout their life together.

We have driven by their farmhouse in North Brooklin which now has new owners. EBWhite's directive has been honored to keep it private as a home for the next owner and not become a museum of sorts. Sounds like "On Golden Pond" to me, where "Things don't change much..."

The local North Brooklin Public Library was a beneficial visit for me because of the librarian, of course! She told me that Katharine volunteered there many hours. So go to Belgrade Public Library and enjoy talking with our wonderful staff. Maybe check out a video or a book or look at a magazine or work at a computer. Rainy day fun there and air conditioned when it is too hot for hiking. Better yet, jump in the lake or calmly canoe in the shade like EBWhite did most summers of his long writing life.





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Real Estate Update —

Current Market Snapshot: Belgrade Lakes & Maine (as of May 2025)

- Belgrade Lakes Region: The median home value stands at \$402,500, reflecting a 5% increase over the past year. Year-to-date there have been 46 homes sold, up from 45 the previous year, with properties averaging 47 days on the market, up from 22 days on the market last year.
- Lakefront: So far this year, there have been just 11 waterfront homes sold in the region with a median sales price of \$700,000. This reflects a 16% decrease in home sales with prices remaining steady.

The Dams Keeper Report

s of this writing, we are beginning our summer in good shape with $oldsymbol{1}$ Great Pond's Village dam 2.28" above full pond with one gate opened three feet after the recent rains. Basically, the water is just 2.28" deep going over the top of the stone spillway. Long Pond and its Wings Mill dam is .96", basically 1", below full pond with gates opened 18" and 3' respectful-Salmon/McGrath is right at 2.16" above full pond with it's single gate

opened just the mandated 1 cfs. flow. Our neighbors on Messalonskee are presently 8.88" below due to maintenance and their hydroelectric demands.

The forecast for the next ten days is just 1.32" of precipitation and with a long-term forecast calling for 21% less precipitation for both May and June followed by 30% less for August and September. All translates into another Chamber of Commerce Summer, if we can believe our forecasters!! As a result, your Dams Committee is trying to start off this summer




